




For your information

1. We just won on the Saratoga vote. There were two key votes:
 - a. The Biden amendment leading the refurbishment decision up to the Administration won 58-33. This means our decision to refurbish the Saratoga at Philadelphia can be implemented if this language survives in the House.
 - b. A second amendment offered by Senator Warner would have required you to certify the national defense necessity of any choice contrary to Newport News. This amendment lost 50-41.
2. I have talked with Sen. Robert Byrd about Rhodesia and also Sen. Stennis. Although this is not certain, it now looks as if Sen. Harry Byrd and Sen. Stennis will enter into a colloquy--rather than offering his amendment.
3. News in the Foreign Relations Committee is that we had Stone beat on the Panama military aid. He did not offer his amendment, and we got the money put back for other Panamanian aid saying it was for use in the region to avoid the word "Panama."
4. The Turkish aid vote is close. We will probably lose it and have to get it on the floor.

THE PRESIDENT'S MEETING WITH EMILE VAN LENNEP
OECD SECRETARY GENERAL

2:00 p.m. - May 3, 1979

I. OBJECTIVES

U.S. -- To express the President's personal interest in the OECD High Level Conference on Employment of Women and, secondarily, in van Lennep's assistance in arranging aid to Turkey.

Van Lennep -- To maintain visible, personal contact with the President on OECD matters.

II. SETTING

The Secretary General is coming to attend a meeting of labor ministers called by Ray Marshall. He understands that he will meet with the President for about ten minutes. The President met him once before while visiting Paris in 1977.

III. KEY ISSUES

1. 1980 OECD Conference on Employment of Women

U.S. Objective: The OECD has just approved the Conference after extensive U.S. lobbying. With the strong backing of Sarah Weddington and Ray Marshall, the U.S. seeks to use the OECD as a forum for raising international awareness of the economic importance of this growing phenomenon. Secretary Marshall will probably lead our delegation.

Van Lennep's Objective: The Secretary General wants to preserve the economic prestige of the Organization and avoid unseemly controversy. No advocate on women's issues, van Lennep is nonetheless politically astute. He overcame his original reservations about the conference when we assured him of its serious economic content and after he saw the interest of other OECD nations.

Points to be Made:

-- Thank the Secretary General for his cooperation in agreeing to hold the conference.

LIMITED OFFICIAL USE

-- Assure him of the President's personal interest in a successful conference that examines employment of women from a rigorously economic point of view.

2. Multilateral Assistance to Turkey

U.S. Objective: To encourage van Lennep to persevere in his role as a prime intermediary in arranging multilateral assistance to Turkey.

Van Lennep's Objective: To gain a first hand reading of U.S. policy.

Essential Factors:

As agreed at the Guadeloupe Summit, the OECD is playing a major role in the multilateral aid effort under West German leadership. Van Lennep sees both his personal reputation and that of the OECD at stake. At some cost to his personal standing with the Turks, he has devoted much time urging them to face the need for internal reforms and compliance with IMF recommendations.

Points to be Made:

-- The U.S. remains committed to these multilateral efforts, as evidenced by the Administration's recent request to Congress for \$100 million in supplemental economic supporting assistance which would raise total U.S. economic aid to Turkey to \$248 million this year.

-- We continue to believe that this aid should be conditional upon Turkey's reaching agreement with the IMF.

-- We appreciate and support van Lennep's efforts to make this crucial multilateral effort a success.

LONDON (UPI) -- BRITONS Poured out to vote for a new parliament Thursday and computer projections forecast a strong conservative victory that would send Margaret Thatcher to No. 10 Downing Street as Britain's first woman prime minister.

Though earlier surveys pointed to a narrow victory for the conservative party, a straw poll of 15,000 voters interviewed as they left the ballot booths in 114 districts predicted that Mrs. Thatcher would come to power in the biggest conservative electoral victory in 20 years.

The computers at Britain's two television networks -- the British Broadcasting Corp. and Independent Television News -- both projected a solid conservative victory.

But early, still inconclusive returns had yet to bear the predictions out. Three-and-one half hours after the polls closed at 10 p.m. (5 p.m. EDT), Thatcher's conservatives and prime minister James Callaghan's labor party had each captured 32 parliamentary seats.

The straw poll conducted by ITN projected that 349 seats would go to the conservatives, 257 to labor, 12 to the liberals, 2 to the Scottish nationalists and 15 to other scattered parties.

That would give the conservatives a parliamentary majority of 63 seats -- the biggest victory since Harold Macmillan came to power with a 100-seat majority in 1959. PICKUP 7THGRAF; FINANCIAL MARKETS



THE CARTER ADMINISTRATION - AN ANALYSIS

In a world dominated by public relations activities, it is most difficult to evaluate the merits and qualifications of public officials. By the same token this places a man such as President Carter at a serious disadvantage. While previous presidents viewed the office in traditional terms, using all its facilities to accomplish a somewhat regal impact, President Carter does not regard the office as requiring a theatrical performance.

The President is his own man, more so than any of his recent predecessors. We should never forget that without deviating from his characteristic low-key reasoned appeal, he gained the nomination and was elected. Moreover, he held well developed concepts and a philosophy of public service when he became president. None of this is especially appreciated, much less understood, by those who have adopted a negative attitude toward him. Despite this, he does his work with poise and dignity, sometimes most effectively and at other times, less so.

Leaders in other countries, in Europe, in Communist countries, and in Japan have not previously treated with a president who functions as he does. They are somewhat baffled because the predictability which could be established in relation to previous occupants of the office is no longer accomplishable. This may yield advantages as well as some disadvantages, but it is misinterpreted by foreign leaders as evidencing indecision, which it is not.

Most presidents have been given the "benefit of the doubt" by the citizenry and the press. Mr. Carter has experienced quite the contrary. His accomplishments are grudgingly acknowledged, and his less successful interventions are promptly denounced, even when more favorable results eventuate. All of this is reflected in political polls which, in the main, give him low marks. These are based on a series of questions designed by sponsoring pollsters, whose coverage is arbitrary and deals with a prescribed area or cross-section. Interpretations vary widely and frequently personal bias and/or superficial deductions are made. At best, the results are suggestive. Only after they are combined with other data, can dependable determinations be established.

The SALT talks and the Chinese reconciliation are significant undertakings. All international negotiations are interrelated. That the Carter Administration realizes this is unmistakable. It should be recognized that the President cannot advertise or announce where various diplomatic matters stand; only when they are consummated can they be announced.

Mr. Carter is a new kind of President. Few have been equally prepared. The fact that he is not a "Hail Fellow, Well met!", that small talk and camaraderie are not his gifts is perhaps unfortunate, but surely not disqualifying. The fact is, he has come closer to matching his words to his deeds than many previous presidents, and this is all done blandly and without fanfare. Consequently, people are inclined to discount him, whereas any objective analysis or comparison should rate him high.

It might be interesting to consider the many candidates who are offering themselves for the presidency and try to visualize what each of them might have accomplished during Mr. Carter's tenure. To what degree would each have been adequate or, indeed, have improved upon his performance?

Perhaps President Carter has been unfortunate in the choice of some of his Executive and Cabinet officers. Yet replacement and recruitment are more difficult today than they have been, and this is a reality which is completely overlooked by his critics. Most gifted men are reluctant to accept public office in the current climate. Inappreciation, if not denunciation, is discouraging and many officials have experienced such treatment. The prevailing attitude of suspicion and mistrust tends to alienate and nullify desire for public service.

It might be helpful if each of us reviewed and reexamined his or her current attitude and evaluation of political and governmental accomplishments. If we did, I suspect we would arrive at more balanced judgments and this could be greatly helpful in encouraging the Administration's accomplishment.

In sum, I believe Mr. Carter's substantial abilities and influence will loom large and be widely recognized by the end of his term!



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

SUBJECT: Possible Meeting with May 6 Coalition

This Sunday, there will be a major anti-nuclear rally/demonstration, beginning at the White House Ellipse and moving toward the Capitol. The May 6 Coalition organizers -- Ralph Nader, Barry Commoner, David Brower, Jane Fonda and others -- are predicting upwards of 100,000 marchers. That seems unlikely; 30,000 or so seems more realistic. Even so, this would clearly be the largest anti-nuclear demonstration the country has ever seen. Of equal significance, it is likely to be the largest protest rally in Washington since the days of the Vietnam War.

For those reasons, the rally is certain to attract enormous public and media attention, both on the day of the event and subsequently. (It will be covered live by PBS). In addition, it is almost certain that the anti-nuclear momentum spurred by Three Mile Island will increase. And probably to a much greater extent than before, the Administration will become the principal target of the anti-nuclear coalition.

This targeting of the Administration is not only unfortunate, but clearly misguided. We have played a leading role in both the effort to reduce nuclear weapons and to make nuclear power safer. As you know, those efforts have included the nuclear non-proliferation program, the Clinch River Breeder Reactor fight, SALT II, the Test Ban Treaty negotiations, and the broad mandate of the Three Mile Island Commission. Further, we have actively promoted alternative energy sources.

Regrettably, the focus of the anti-nuclear groups has not been on those items. They have focused instead on Secretary Schlesinger's perceived strong bias in favor of

nuclear power and on our nuclear siting and licensing bill (and most recently the decision to proceed with it only a few days after Three Mile Island). To the anti-nuclear groups, the Administration is viewed as entirely pro-nuclear, having virtually no concern about nuclear plant safety or the health and environmental effects of nuclear plants.

It is unlikely that this misperception of the Administration can be transformed overnight. Nor is it likely that those attending the rally, or their leaders, will be open to a great deal of persuasion. Nonetheless, we believe there is real value to granting the rally's leaders request for a meeting:

- o This constituency is growing rapidly -- especially in certain key States -- and may already represent just about the most committed grassroots lobby in the country. It is not a constituency that we can afford to ignore or appear to ignore.
- o Many of those in the anti-nuclear constituency were strong supporters of yours in 1976; but they have become disaffected, to a large extent because of the DOE policies. While it unlikely that all of your previous supporters in this coalition can again be made supporters, the possibility for getting a good percentage back is real and should not be discounted.
- o The Administration has justifiably prided itself on our openness. That has, of course, provided the country with a stark contrast from the Nixon Administration. We want to make certain that contrast remains vivid in the public's mind. But we fear that it may not if, during as significant a demonstration as this, we appear insensitive and unyielding. We do not want to invite comparisons with the typical Nixon response of disdain and abhorrence to the major anti-war rallies.
- o As already noted, the media coverage of the demonstration will be extensive. If we do not make some visible gesture of understanding and recognition on May 6, we are certain to be way behind the curve in subsequently trying to defend our positions and to get our positive message across. We can avoid that problem, and can be part of the same news cycle, by meeting with the Coalition's leaders.

Unless you disagree, our current plans are to meet with the Coalition's leaders on May 6 (Sunday) at the White House. We believe the White House should be represented by Stu Eizenstat, along with Frank Press, Charlie Warren and Jack Watson. We will work with the Coalition's leaders on timing and their representation.

We request that, if the meeting appears to be constructive and useful, you drop-by for a few minutes to confirm your own concern about nuclear safety and perhaps to listen to one of the Coalition leaders' statements.


The Coalition has requested a meeting with you, but has been turned down. So if they come to the White House, there is no basis for expecting you to attend. But an unanticipated drop-by -- the press would be present for the meeting in any event and could be brought in if you attended -- would show your personal concern with the issues raised by the Coalition and would be a symbolic gesture of great value to the Administration.

If you are interested, we will work out arrangements with Phil so that you could attend the session if the prior condition of a constructive dialogue was being met.

I. PURPOSE

- To greet the officers, board members, and staff of the League of Women Voters.
- To express appreciation for their dedication to increased voter information and participation.
- To ask support of Administration SALT and energy policies, as well as other general policies.

II. BACKGROUND

The League Board is terminating its annual Washington legislative meeting with a White House briefing on SALT by Roger Molander and on energy by David Rubenstein.

They are generally supportive of the Administration's energy proposals.

However, they do not consider SALT a major priority. (They are focusing on trade initiatives that support a systematic reduction of tariff and nontariff trade barriers and broad, long-range presidential authority to negotiate trade agreements.)

Ruth Hinerfeld is the League President. She is particularly competent. She will say a few words of thanks following your remarks.

For information only: Nancy Neuman, a League Vice-President, resigned from the National Advisory Committee

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for Women. We have since named her to a regional board of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board. She continues to work well with me and to cooperate with the Administration and regrets the haste of the resignations.

III. TALKING POINTS

1. I know you have been briefed by members of my staff about SALT and the Administration's energy policy. I want to reiterate the importance of your support of both of these efforts.
 - a. SALT - Comments; importance of making it a priority.
 - b. ENERGY - Comments. Appreciation of League position in support of (1) passage of windfall profits tax; (2) decontrol; (3) use of solar and other renewable resources; and (4) conservation efforts.
2. ERA - I am continuing to press for ERA ratification in three more states. I feel that education about what the ERA will and won't do is particularly important. Therefore we are making initial plans for a fall ERA educational event here in the White House.
3. Women's Appointments - I am working hard to include women in all levels of government. Several of my top appointees have come from your ranks, including Ruth Clusen, Assistant Secretary at Energy, Lucy Benson, Under Secretary of State for Security Assistance, Science and Technology and Peggy Lampl, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Congressional Affairs.

I welcome your assistance in finding more such qualified women for appointment.

As you also know, I am insisting that women and minorities be well represented in our judicial appointments. I appreciate your support for our efforts.

IV. PARTICIPANTS

Approximately 225 state representatives, board members, and staff of the League of Women Voters.
