Subject: New Orders for Durable Goods in May

Tomorrow (Thursday, June 21) at 2:00 P.M., the Census Bureau will release its estimate of new orders for durable goods received by manufacturers in May.

Total new orders increased 2.3 percent last month, but they had fallen sharply in April. The May level of new orders is 4 percent below the average monthly level in the first quarter.

Orders for nondefense capital goods were approximately unchanged in May, following a drop of almost 14 percent in April that was partly a consequence of a reduction in orders for commercial aircraft. Excluding commercial aircraft, capital goods orders in May, however, were 5-1/2 percent below the average for the first quarter.

The new order figures for April and May confirm the pervasive slowdown in the economy during the second quarter indicated by earlier data on employment, personal income, industrial production and retail sales. The weakening of orders for capital goods is particularly disheartening, since it suggests that business may be trimming their plans for long-term capital outlays. If the strength in business fixed investment we have been expecting melts away, there will be little hope of avoiding a recession.

Last week I had the great honor to represent the United States at the opening of an International Communication Agency exhibition, "America Now", in Belgrade, Yugoslavia.

Fritz told me I would find "no long faces in Yugoslavia". He was right. My hosts were unusually friendly, gracious and generous with their time. They spoke enthusiastically and warmly of better relations with the United States since you took office.

While in the country, I visited several areas of Montenegro that had been recently devastated by earthquakes. That visit gave me an opportunity to underscore how much we sympathize both with their loss of human life and with horrendous damage to their historical and cultural monuments.

It is my understanding that the Administration is working hard to find additional funds for relief to Montenegro. From what I saw there, both in physical damage and in the spirit and determination of the people, there could be no better expenditure of money anywhere. Their gratitude would be immense.

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


After being a bearer of bad news for so long, we should take advantage of this opportunity. I would prefer that you read the statement, but the talking points are available if you do not have enough time for preparation.

SUBJECT: Talking Points for Inauguration of West Wing
Solar System, 6/20/79

1. In 1891, President William Henry Harrison first installed electric lights in the White House. Commercial electricity was not yet economically feasible, but President Harrison brought electricity to the White House to affirm his faith in the genius of American technology and the future that electricity could bring.

2. Unfortunately, this kind of faith in our technological capacity has flagged in recent years. Too many have reacted to the energy crisis with paralysis and fear. There is almost a mood of national hypochondria about the energy crisis. False prophets of doom now claim that the future will be worse than the present and America's power is in eclipse.

3. Pessimism did not build America. It was built with vision, faith and hard work. It is time to pull ourselves out of our nation's doldrums, to recognize our great untapped potential and resources, and to seize the opportunities before us to build a more prosperous, self-reliant future in which all Americans can share.

4. Today, in directly harnessing the power of the sun, we are taking the energy that God gave us -- the most renewable energy we will ever have -- and using it to replace our dwindling supplies of fossil fuel.

5. There is no longer any question that solar energy is both feasible and cost-effective. In those homes now using electricity, a typical solar hot water system can pay for itself in 7 to 10 years. As energy costs increase, that period will be reduced. Today, all over the country, Americans are harnessing solar energy. For example, in San Bernardino, California, the Community Development Commission operates

a solar energy system that provides space heating and hot water for ten homes. In Shenandoah, Georgia, a recreation center is heated and cooled largely by solar power. From coast to coast there are people who have started projects like these -- and some of them are here today.

6. Today, I am sending to the Congress legislative recommendations for a new solar strategy that will move our nation toward the goal we share -- true energy security and abundant, readily available, energy supplies. By the end of this century, by the year 2000, I want our nation to derive 20 percent of its energy needs from solar and other renewable forms of energy. This is a bold and ambitious goal, but it is attainable if we have the will to achieve it. Government action alone -- Federal money alone -- cannot guarantee that we will meet this challenge. It will require a concerted effort by us all -- government, industry, inventors, entrepreneurs, home-builders, concerned citizens.

7. I am proposing a coordinated, government-wide effort, using all the tools at our disposal, to spend more than \$1 billion in Fiscal Year 1980 to stimulate solar and other renewable forms of energy. I am directing the Tennessee Valley Authority, our nation's largest utility, to become a solar showcase. I am proposing major tax credits to speed the development and commercialization of solar energy. This strong Federal commitment to solar energy will be sustained in the years to come.

8. The most important new program in this solar strategy is the creation of a Solar Bank in the Department of Housing and Urban Development. This Solar Bank, which will be funded out of the Energy Security Trust Fund from the revenues we will obtain from the windfall profits tax, will allow us to encourage substantially the use of solar energy in residential and commercial buildings.

9. In the year 2000, the solar water heater we are dedicating today will still be here, supplying cheap, efficient energy. A generation from now, this solar heater can either be a curiosity, a museum piece, an example of a road not taken, or it can be just a small part of one of the greatest adventures in our nation's proud history -- harnessing the power of the sun to enrich our lives as we move away from our crippling dependence on foreign oil. I am determined that America will move toward the solar age.

FACT SHEET

THE WHITE HOUSE SOLAR SYSTEM

The White House Solar Hot Water Heating System, which was completed at the end of April 1979, is located on the roof of the Cabinet Room in the West Wing of the White House. The West Wing is separate from the Residence, and is where the offices of the President and his immediate staff are located. The solar panels can be seen from Pennsylvania Avenue.

The primary user of the hot water in the West Wing is the kitchen of the Staff Mess, which is in the basement. As is normal in such installations, the solar system preheats water before it enters the regular hot water heater, thereby reducing the energy required. The amount of energy saved in any given system will depend upon the weather, incoming water temperature and water use.


The energy provided by the White House solar system will replace approximately \$1,000 per year of steam, at present prices. As energy costs increase in the future, so will savings.

The purpose of the White House Solar System is not, however, to demonstrate economic or technical feasibility, both of which are well established. Rather, the purpose is to provide a highly visible demonstration of solar energy and the Carter Administration's commitment to alternate energy resources.

Technical details are as follows:

- 32 panels in 4 rows of 8
- total collector area: 611 square feet
- orientation: due south, 33° tilt
- 600 gallons water storage
- heating fluid: 50 gallons glycol
- flow rate: 10 gallons per minute
- system output: 75 - 130M BTU/yr
- back-up system: steam

Your Inflation Meeting with the Speaker
and Senator Byrd

I have attached talking points for your meeting with the Speaker and Senator Byrd tomorrow. You should ask them to appoint five Members from each House to serve on a joint Congressional-Administration working group. Two weeks ago, you approved the formation of such a group to recommend improvements to your anti-inflation program.

Your economic advisors are putting together a range of policy options to be considered in these discussions. You ought to rule out mandatory controls in the beginning, but make it clear you will listen to any other options on which a consensus can be reached.

The purpose of this consultation process is to develop a program for the next phase of our inflation program which will have the support of Congress and leaders in business and labor as well.

The Vice President and Ray Marshall are scheduled to meet on Thursday with leaders of the AFL-CIO in which they will inform them of the consultation process. A similar meeting will be arranged with business leaders. We are hopeful that the actual working sessions will begin next week and the working group can complete its work as soon as possible, perhaps even before the August recess.

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TALKING POINTS

1. I want to talk to you this morning about the anti-inflation program -- and how we can work together to reshape it and make it more effective.
2. Inflation is simply much higher today than any of us could have expected just six months ago. When inflation first hit the double-digit level earlier this year, we had every reason to expect that it would come back down when what we had hoped were temporary increases in food and energy prices subsided. Now even with food prices leveling out, inflation is likely to run at about 10 percent for the year.
3. Double-digit inflation means slower economic growth -- and sharply increased prospects for a recession. Unemployment almost certainly will rise later this year and could approach 7 percent as we head into 1980. For the next year, there is virtually no chance that real incomes will increase.
4. That economic scenario is bad for the nation, and it could be disaster for the Democratic Party. Unless we can demonstrate that we can tackle these tough economic problems, we are likely to see the repercussions at the polls. In 1980, not only is the Presidency at stake, but for the first time in a decade, there is a real prospect of losing the Senate (with 24 Democratic seats up) or having our working majority reduced. I fear that we could face substantial losses in the House.
5. One thing for sure is that our situation will not get better if we do nothing. The OPEC nations are unlikely to relieve the pressure. And efforts by labor and business to catch up will prove futile, merely driving the overall inflation rate even higher.
6. I suggest that we resolve to roll up our sleeves and work together to tackle these problems -- as national leaders and as Democrats. I intend to name a five-person working group to work with the Congress to reshape our anti-inflation effort. I would like you to do the same, i.e., to name five members from each body to meet with our group regularly in a joint Administration-Congressional effort.

7. The time to begin this effort is now. The recent District Court decision against my using procurement power to enforce the guidelines gives us the opportunity to take a new look at the program. The oil price increase that OPEC is likely to announce next week is further reason we need to act immediately.
8. I have asked my Economic Policy Group to put together a working paper which can serve as an initial agenda for the working group sessions. I am hopeful that the working group will consider a wide range of options. The only option I cannot accept is mandatory wage and price controls. As soon as that working paper is completed, we will be in touch with you to schedule the first working group sessions.
9. As the working group progresses, I suggest it receive regular input from labor and business, in an effort to see if we can form a broad consensus around whatever program emerges.
10. As I look back at the record of the first several months of the anti-inflation program, I am convinced that it has suffered because we have failed to sufficiently involve the Congress. We need to change that. I cannot solve this inflation problem alone -- I need your help.
11. I am hopeful the working group can complete its work as soon as possible, perhaps even before the August recess. I am ready to commit substantial Administration resources to this joint effort. I hope you will pledge the same.

Though the Leadership may have questions about SALT and the Tokyo Summit, you should try to direct the discussion as much as possible to domestic issues. The one exception is Panama.

IV. AGENDA

1. Panama

You should thank the Speaker for his assistance with scheduling and indicate that the delay seems to have paid off. We now have the votes to pass the implementing legislation and are hopeful that damaging amendments can be defeated. You should emphasize that our vote counts are very close and that you need the continued help of the Leadership.

2. Department of Education

The House worked on the bill until about 5:30 Tuesday afternoon. You should ask the Speaker when he next plans to take the bill up. You should push him to do so before the recess at a time when Members can be forced to complete work on the bill.

To date we have a slim margin -- but the margin decreases by the day. Another appeal to the House Leadership to help with undecideds would be timely.

3. Energy

Solar - You will be dedicating the solar facility and announcing solar initiatives today at 1:30. You should give the Leadership the highlights including:

- o \$100 million Solar Bank (similar to Steve Neal's proposal);
- o goal of 20% of national energy use to be supplied by solar by year 2000.

House Leadership Meeting - On Tuesday the Speaker convened a group to discuss energy matters. Included were: Jim Wright, John Brademas, Danny Rostenkowski, Lud Ashley, John Dingell, Bill Moorhead, Don Fuqua, Toby Moffett, Mike McCormack, Dick Ottinger, Sid Yates, and Tom Bevill.

The consensus of the group was that:

- o They should move quickly (next week) with the Moorhead Syn-Fuels bill;
- o They are looking forward to receipt of Phase II of your energy package including the Energy Security Fund uses;
- o They should move forward on Udall's "fast track" proposal and Windfall Profits Tax;
- o That mandatory conservation proposals can be sold to the American public if they are packaged with a goal of energy "independence and plenty."

Note - this group was not inclined toward Jackson-Johnston grab-bag approach to energy legislation.

In your comments, I suggest you concentrate on the following:

Synthetic Fuels - You should indicate your general support for the Moorhead bill. Last week Stu met

with Wright and Moorhead and indicated our specific concerns -- two of which are that it fit within the framework of the Energy Security Fund and that it be somewhere in the range of 500,000 to 650,000 barrels per day.

You should also be aware that Carl Perkins is holding a press conference today announcing his proposal to create a \$200 billion synthetic fuels public corporation. He promises to pass it out of his committee (Education and Labor).

In short, syn fuels is becoming everybody's answer. You should indicate your concern about making syn fuels the sole vehicle for achieving substantial reductions in oil imports. We need to take a broader view of that tremendously important national objective -- looking at increased investments in new sources of natural gas, gas from coal, solar energy, biomass and the like.

Windfall Profits - On Tuesday, Ways and Means reported out the bill and by a vote of 18-17 recommended a closed rule. The House is likely to act next week. I suggest that any comments be extremely general and that you not discuss rates so as not to provoke discussion between Wright and Rostenkowski.

Jackson-Johnston Bill - Senator Byrd asked last week that you pressure Senator Baker to endorse the bill. He is likely to continue to press for a statement of support.

You should indicate that you plan to announce Phase II of your energy plan around July 15 and that many of the Jackson-Johnston proposals will be treated in that announcement.

Note - Energy and Natural Resources plans hearings on the Jackson-Johnston bill through July 20.

Energy Summit - Senator Byrd may bring up his proposal that you convene a group of Congressional "energy leaders" to hammer out solutions.

You should state your belief that the problem is not so much one of leadership as lack of "followership". You should again solicit their help and advice in developing a cohesive, rational energy policy; one which is more than a collection of ~~pet~~ pet ideas.

4. Treaty Termination

(You might want to talk with Senator Byrd about this at the end of the breakfast).

On June 6 the Senate passed a proposal by Senator Harry Byrd which would require you to seek the consent of the Senate in terminating any treaty. The immediate problem is that the proposal, if applied retroactively, would reverse our notification of termination of the Taiwan mutual defense treaty. Senator Robert Byrd has joined with Senators Church, Javits and several others in sponsoring an amendment to make the Harry Byrd proposal prospective only. We are supporting their efforts.

You should ask Senator Byrd (1) when the resolution will be taken up; (2) how he feels it will fare; (3) what the Administration should be doing to help.

Dear Mr. President:

I appreciate greatly your generous note of June 12 regarding our pre-Vienna talk. May I congratulate you on your achievements at Vienna--up to my fullest expectations--and your sound and forceful speech to the Congress.

In your note you asked for my personal views on the Treaty's presentation to the Senate and the American people. I place first in importance knocking down the claims of the opponents that the advice of the Senate must now be sought before consent. This, they claim, gives the Senate the constitutional right and obligation to offer amendments. I believe this contention is completely false.

During the past two years you and your principal advisors, the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Defense, and the Director of ACDA have consulted the Senate in many ways. You have on many occasions seen the leaders of the Senate and many individual Senators about SALT. Your advisors have testified before all the appropriate committees a great many times. During the negotiations all the suggestions of the Senators have been given the fullest consideration possible. It has been impossible, of course, to satisfy everyone in order to reach agreement with the Soviet government. I feel very strongly that these facts should be stated by you and your advisors on every possible occasion so that the public will thoroughly understand that you have already given every consideration to the advice of the Senate. You are now offering a Treaty that is in a real sense a consensus and its ratification is in the vital interest of our nation, our allies, and the world as a whole.

I have other thoughts which I will discuss with Cy Vance before submitting them to you. It would be most helpful to me if I could have a few minutes of your time after you return from Japan to hear directly your impressions of the Soviet leadership and the direction we should move in the future.

Subject: Real GNP in the Second Quarter

This morning (Wednesday, June 20), the Commerce Department provided us with its very preliminary estimate of real GNP growth in the second quarter. This estimate will never be published. It is an estimate based on fragmentary data (only one month of the quarter for some series), and so it is subject to large subsequent revisions.

Commerce estimates that real GNP declined at a 2.4 percent annual rate this quarter, following an 0.8 percent growth rate in the first quarter. The principal source of the decline was weakness in personal consumption expenditures, which declined at a 4 percent rate in real terms. The fall in real consumption expenditures did not reflect a large rise in the saving rate (although it did go up a little), but rather the effects of large price increases on consumer real incomes and purchasing power.

Changes in other categories of real GNP were relatively small in the second quarter. Residential construction declined, reflecting the drop in housing starts since the fourth quarter of 1978. Business fixed investment also declined a little, but this may reflect the fact that April data on capital goods shipments were distorted by the Teamsters' strike.

GNP prices rose about as fast in the second quarter as in the first -- about a 10 percent annual rate. The rise in consumer food prices slowed considerably in the second quarter, to a 7-1/2 percent annual rate. But the rise of energy prices to the consumer accelerated to almost a 50 percent annual rate.

As we have indicated to you in other memos, the economy has been much weaker in the first half of this year than we had expected. This second quarter decline in real GNP may mean that the economy is already headed into recession, but we cannot be sure. It is clear, however, we are in for a period of sluggish economic activity over the remainder of this year and into early 1980.
