MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

Subject: July CPI (to be released at 9:00 a.m., Friday)

As I told you on the phone, the July CPI will show no increase over June. This is the first month the CPI has failed to increase since March 1967 (1967 not 1977).

A 5.7 percent decline in the index for mortgage interest rates was the major reason for the good performance. The July CPI is finally showing the effects of the interest rate declines which began in April or May. There was also reasonably good performance elsewhere. All items except mortgage interest costs rose "only" 0.6 percent (for an annual rate of 7.4 percent). The "all items except home purchase and financing, food, and energy," which we watch for underlying trends, rose at an annual rate of 8.3 percent.

Food prices rose 1 percent, somewhat less than we had expected in view of the large rise in July wholesale food prices. Next month may see some catch up in retail food prices.

Energy prices rose only 0.3 percent. The price of gasoline fell slightly (-0.5 percent).

SUBJECT: Weekly Report

Weather. Shower activity was restricted mostly to the eastern half of South Dakota, southern Minnesota, Wisconsin, and along the Gulf Coast states. Scattered thundershowers were also observed in the lower Great Lakes region. A high pressure system over the Southeastern U.S. is bringing warm, humid air into the Corn Belt. The combination of temperatures and the increasing southerly flow will cause a further decline in available soil moisture for most of the Great Plains and Southeastern United States.

Drought. A USDA report sent to Senator Talmadge on August 1 assessed the impact on U.S. agriculture of the drought and hot weather. The report stated that, though some farmers will be hurt by the drought, many will be able to benefit from the current higher prices. Overall effects on farm and food prices are judged as modest, however, because of large stocks of the major commodities.

Export. Wheat inspections for export for the week ending July 31 were up from last week, while soybean and corn inspections declined:

China. China purchased 201,000 tons of wheat for delivery in 1980/81, bringing the total grain purchased for 1980/81 delivery to 4.01 million tons of wheat.

USSR. The Philippines has lifted its ban on the Soviet Union's participation in bidding for urea fertilizer after the Soviets fulfilled its obligation to supply 50,000 tons of the commodity. The government's fertilizer and pesticide authority officials said the Soviet Union has delivered 30,000 tons of the fertilizer and has promised to ship the rest by September. Officials said they black-listed the Soviets in November when they fell short of their commitments. The Soviet government later claimed they had declared force majeure, but showed no documentary proof.

Pravda reports that the 1980 Soviet fodder crop is behind schedule in many key regions, including the region of Yaroslavl where as of the end of July, 17 percent was harvested and 1/3 of the silage had been laid in.

Retenders. The CCC retendered 9,000 tons of soybean oil, thus completing the retendering of the 30,000 tons acquired as a result of the export sales suspension against the USSR.

Purchase Program for Corn Ends. The CCC rejected all offers received July 31 to sell corn to the CCC and has canceled its special corn purchase program, since a strengthening corn market has given farmers little incentive to sell corn to the CCC when they could obtain better prices on the open market. CCC purchases of corn total 4.1 million tons.

SUBJECT: Weekly Report of HHS Activities

Studies of Chromosome Damage to Love Canal Residents Underway. The Department has assigned six people to the Love Canal area and has recruited other outreach workers to help coordinate a cooperative health study that has been proposed by the University of Buffalo. An independent study of chromosome abnormalities of persons evaluated from Love Canal in 1978 is also being developed by the Center for Disease Control.

Health Status of Cuban Entrants. The Department has completed medical screening of Cubans arriving prior to July 6, 1980. The Center for Disease Control has reported that of the 115,000 Cubans who arrived between April 21 and July 6, 1,608 had positive tests for TB, and 3,806 were found to have syphilis. Treatment has been completed for 90 percent of the syphilis cases, and the remainder are currently undergoing treatment.

Department Honored by the Government of Zaire. Drs. Joel C. Breman and Karl Johnson, members of the Department's Center for Disease Control (CDC), were awarded high civilian honors by Ambassador Rososgo Mutale of Zaire at a ceremony in Atlanta on August 1. The awards were presented in recognition for CDC's epidemiological assistance in an outbreak of African hemorrhagic fever in Zaire in 1976.

Activities at the Democratic National Covention. My itinerary during the Convention includes a number of press conferences and speeches, as well as remarks before the Alabama, Maryland, and New York caucuses, the DNC Women's Caucus, and the Carter/Mondale Black Caucus.

SUBJECT: Weekly Report of ED Major Activities

Legislation

Higher Education Act Reauthorization

House and Senate Conferees have completed action on almost all parts of the reauthorization bill except Title IV, Student Financial Assistance. The conference is to resume at the call of the Chair, probably during the week of August 18.

Youth Act

The House is scheduled to take up the Youth Act, H.R. 6711, on Wednesday, August 20. Leadership aides are optimistic that the bill will be completed that week. We have very serious concerns about the potential impact of two suggested amendments: (1) striking the education title from the Youth Act; and (2) eliminating vocational education from the program.

FY 1981 ED Appropriations

On Wednesday, July 30, the House Appropriations Subcommittee marked up the FY '81 budget request.

While the results of the Subcommittee's action have been embargoed until August 21, early indications are that the Subcommittee:

- o Adopted the Administration's \$2.8 billion request for Title I ESEA.
- o Agreed to fund Title I concentration grants at \$145 million, an increase of \$45 million over the 1980 level;
- o Restored impact area aid payments to \$650 million, or about the same as last year; and

The Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) for regulations implementing the Lau decision was published on August 5, 1980; special briefings were held for advocacy and educational groups prior to a formal press conference. Public Hearings have been scheduled in six cities (San Antonio, New York, Denver, New Orleans, San Francisco, and Chicago) for the 2nd and 3rd weeks in September.

Since publication of the NPRM, press coverage and Congressional feedback have been generally supportive.

HUD Officials Respond to Concern on Love Canal. Assistant Secretaries Lawrence B. Simons and Dicken Cherry and Deputy Assistant Secretary Walter G. Farr, Jr. met today with Congressman John LaFalce, Mayor Michael O'Laughlin and other key City officials from Niagara Falls, New York, to discuss the Love Canal situation. HUD representatives informed the Mayor that we will make 150 Section 8 unit certificates available immediately, that we will provide public housing new construction funds and take other actions to provide more large family housing for low income residents of the Love Canal area. A Section 108 loan guarantee can also be made available to the City if officials desire this form of aid.

New UDAG Awards Go to Small Cities. The latest round of Urban Development Action Grants for small cities is in the process of being announced for 39 communities. A total of \$42 million in Action Grants will be awarded. These grants will be used on 43 projects and are expected to generate \$245 million from the private sector and create 6,600 new permanent jobs and 3,700 construction jobs in the economy.

HUD Cooperates in Public Education About Energy. Staff of our public affairs office have begun discussions with the J. Walter Thompson Company which will lead to a residential energy conservation advertising campaign. Through this initiative HUD will fund television and radio spots and print ads as part of the Administration's overall energy information outreach effort.



Alaska. Cecil, Stu and I met this morning with the Alaska Coalition. The meeting went very well. The Coalition is hopeful, as am I, that House leaders can move the Senate compromise somewhat closer to the House bill before the Senate compromise comes up beginning on August 18. In any case, the Coalition agrees with us that getting the Alaska legislation this year is essential and that passage of the Senate compromise is a necessary step.

Environmental Community. Jane, Bob and I have all been increasingly involved in convention and campaign activities in recent weeks, and we will be in New York next week. There will be an environmental caucus at the convention, the first ever at any convention. We have also been working, as you know, with environmental leaders here in Washington. My preliminary thinking is that you should meet with environmental leaders early this fall.

Principal Activities of the Department of Justice
for the week of August 2 through August 9, 1980

1. Meetings and Events

On August 4, the Attorney General addressed the dinner meeting of the Judicial Administration Division of the American Bar Association on the subject of legislative approaches to judicial unfitness. Through Wednesday evening he participated in other meetings in connection with the annual meeting of the American Bar Association in Honolulu, Hawaii. On Thursday he left Honolulu for additional ABA activities in Australia, preceded by meetings with a number of government officials and attorneys in New Zealand.

2. Civil Rights Meeting

On Thursday, Acting Attorney General Charles Renfrew and Assistant Attorney General Drew Days met with representatives of the Black Leadership Forum, including Benjamin Hooks, Coretta Scott King, the Reverend Jesse Jackson and Carl Holman. The black leaders were seeking a stronger federal civil rights presence in the nation's cities, including additional efforts against police brutality, and stronger efforts against the Ku Klux Klan. The Department leaders listed efforts to date to meet issues of concern, including creation of Civil Rights Units in U.S. Attorneys' Offices, increased use of Community Relations Service personnel, and high priority for the investigation of the shooting of Vernon Jordan, President of the National Urban League.

3. Detroit Arrests

The FBI arrested seven Detroit area men on Thursday and are seeking an eighth in connection with a shooting attack on George Lester Stewart, a black man. The eight were charged with conspiring to deprive Stewart of his constitutional rights and four were charged with the shooting. Agents also confiscated firearms, ammunition, and assorted Ku Klux Klan matter.

4. Highway Bid-Rigging

A road company executive was sentenced to 60 days in prison after pleading guilty to a conspiracy charge related to bid-rigging

on a Richmond, Virginia airport paving contract. Three companies involved in the project previously were fined a total of \$1,125,000 in connection with bid-rigging on the Richmond job and other contracts. The legal actions are part of an Antitrust Division criminal investigation into the multi-million dollar highway construction industry.

REPORT TO THE PRESIDENT

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Steel: Our first top level meeting with the petitioner, U.S. Steel, went well. We are now trying to put into words a position we hope will be agreeable to the steel industry, the European Community, the Japanese and the U.S. Government; and are hopeful of completing this phase within the next few days so that we can then explore the matter further with our foreign friends. We shall submit it to the EPG.

Industrial Policy Statement: The several hundred Federal college and graduate student summer interns with whom I met this week evinced deep interest in Federal energy programs, the background to our energy problems, and to my surprise, Federal export promotion programs and the competitiveness of U.S. goods in world markets. They are eager to know why it is we can't catch up to and move in front of our competition. Their linkage of these issues indicates their general understanding of some of the underlying problems of the economy and suggests that the degree and depth of responsiveness that your industrial revitalization program will likely evoke. It also, I think, argues for the including in Administration formulations a true characterization of the sectoral and regional nature of the problems faced by this otherwise strong and resilient economy.

Energy Conservation: We have been working hard to meet DoC energy conservation goals, and I believe that the true accomplishments of the Department have been masked by a failure to adjust the prescribed departmental goals to reflect the activities required this year only by the decennial census. The matter of goal equity aside, I am concerned about the administrative burden that has resulted from the reporting requirements, particularly as it regards the development of 1975 statistics for comparative purposes. Putting these records in shape for such comparisons is a major undertaking. I have discussed with Admiral Freeman my concerns for improving the practicability of the statistical demands and for placing a greater emphasis on achievements related to the operating realities of agencies than on the accumulation of historic surveys. My experience is that this type of activity ordinarily results in volumes of unread papers prepared at great expense.

Physical Space Requirements: The primary purpose of my referenced meeting with Admiral Freeman was to discuss physical space requirements. I am delighted by the change from a leasing to a building policy. The inefficiency of our operations in our present space is incalculable. While we are

looking to interim solutions, I believe that such a building program will dramatically improve our ability to function. Not only would near-term initiation of such a building program minimize its eventual cost, but it would also create jobs during the building process and add space much sooner. A means to advance this program would be cost sensible and increase operating efficiency earlier.

VA Presidential Update

On Target - Normally, the necessary expansion in our medical facilities would have increased VA's consumption of energy by 3% over prior levels. Instead, our latest annual report to Department of Energy reflects a 7.1 trillion savings in BTU consumption for a cost avoidance net of \$21.2 million. Report validates accuracy and value of our long-range plans and cites pioneering concepts in the use of heat extraction, solar energy and geothermal resources that will be beneficial to the public at large as well as the agency.

Also on the conservation front, our 8-month test of doing hospital laundry in low rather than high temperature water has been completed - and it works. We will expand this procedure to all of our facilities, and estimate annual savings of 2 billion BTUs and \$2 million . . . 11 of our medical centers have received American Hospital Association awards for reducing energy consumption from 10 to more than 20% over the prior year.

Increase in Productivity - VA increased its productivity in FY 1979 by 2%. Continuing increases is one of my highest priorities. Our better defined productivity indicators have been approved by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and OPM. Top managers have been put on notice that their productivity performance will be an important determinant in SES evaluations and allowed levels under the ZBB process.

SUBJECT: Weekly Report of HHS Activities

Unaccompanied Cuban Minors. The Department is negotiating with the Department of State and the Immigration and Naturalization Service on the legal issues surrounding the resettlement of unaccompanied Cuban minors. Meanwhile, 41 people have been placed in the camps to work with the minors under a Departmental contract with the Spanish Family Guidance Center of the University of Miami School of Medicine. At this time, there are 19,000 Cuban refugees remaining in the three operating facilities set up for refugee care at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin; Ft. Chaffee, Arkansas; and Indiantown Gap, Pennsylvania.

U.S. and Venezuela Health Cooperation Agreement. The Department and the Venezuelan Ministry of Health signed a health cooperation agreement on Monday. The agreement stems from a U.S./Venezuela Science and Technology agreement signed in January and is designed to support domestic health objectives in both countries. Areas of cooperation include health manpower planning, development of maintenance systems for hospital facilities and hospital equipment, research in health care delivery systems, health accounting, and biomedical research.

Youth Employment Demonstration Grants. The Department's Youth Development Bureau (YDB) is in the process of completing negotiations with the Departments of Labor and Justice for \$2 million to fund YDB's Youth Employment Demonstration Grants for FY 1981. The program has been in existence for two years and has served approximately 1,400 youths annually. The demonstration will be conducted at 22 runaway youth centers across the country.

- The Federal Reserve's report, released late this afternoon, that M1-A increased \$8.2 billion and M1-B increased \$8.9 billion in the August 6 statement week was unexpected by market participants. Analysts had initially been predicting at most a \$3 billion rise in M1-A. Yields on Treasury issues posted sharp upward adjustments in response to the news, with additional increases possible next week.
- Large current and anticipated supplies of Treasury securities and the absence of permanent investors depressed the Treasury market. Interest rates rose on balance in reaction to statistics showing strength in the economy and continuing inflation at the producer level.
- The corporate and municipal markets successfully absorbed large slates of new financings at higher interest rates. The 30-day corporate visible supply declined substantially to \$3.8 billion, while the 30-day municipal visible supply stands at a relatively small \$1.4 billion.
- The foreign exchange markets were generally quiet and exchange rate movements narrow. The dollar closed mixed in London. It rose against the German mark and fell against the Swiss franc and Japanese yen.

2. SECRET SERVICE CANDIDATE AND SPOUSE PROTECTION

- After you signed the legislation to authorize protection for major candidates' spouses 120 days before the general election, the Secret Service immediately began to provide

protection for Mrs. Reagan and Mrs. Bush. At this moment Secret Service protection has not yet been requested for Mrs. Anderson, but is expected.

- Senator and Mrs. Kennedy's Secret Service protection was discontinued at noon today.

3. NEW YORK CITY FINANCES

- On Monday, August 11, 1980, Mayor Koch submitted to the New York State Financial Control Board his new Four Year Financial Plan covering the City's Fiscal Years 1981 through 1984. At the same time, he informed Secretary Miller of the City's intention to request the extension of the remaining \$900 million in Federal guarantees of New York City bonds in Fiscal Years 1981 and 1982. The Treasury staff continues to review the request which we had received informally several weeks ago.

Sharply Reduced Prospects for U.S. Grains and Oilseeds, Lower World Output. Total world grain production for 1980/81 is forecast 1 percent lower than last month's estimate, reflecting sharply reduced prospects in the United States and smaller expected outturns for the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. Total output of grains and pulses in the USSR are still expected to fall in last month's range of 200-225 million tons, but the most likely level is now expected to be slightly lower at 210 million tons due to July's unfavorable weather. World cotton production in 1980/81 is projected to total 64.9 million bales, slightly below last season's record crop. Although sharply lower expected yields point to a 12-percent decline in U.S. production, output abroad is expected to increase to 52.1 million as stronger prospects over the past month in the Soviet Union and Pakistan more than offset slight reductions in Turkey and the Sudan. World oilseed production is estimated at 167 million metric tons for 1980/81, down 11 million tons below 1979/80, mainly reflecting lower production in the United States.

Tighter Supplies of Grains, Oilseeds and Cotton in Prospect. Prospective U.S. grain, oilseed, and cotton supplies have tightened significantly over the past month and prices have risen sharply. While supplies of grains and oilseeds will not decline as much as production in 1980/81 due to large carry-in stocks, a continued high level of total use will pull down stocks substantially. Season-ending feed grain stocks in relation to use likely will be well below the average of the past 5 years. Cotton disappearance is expected to decline, although supplies will remain tight relative to use.



1980/81 Soviet Grain Imports To Be Slightly Lower. USSR imports during July-June 1980/81 are expected to total about 28.0 million tons, a reduction of 2 million tons from the previous estimate and 3 million below a year ago. The tightening of world grain supplies during July, especially for coarse grains, could limit Soviet attempts to rebuild stocks as rapidly as had earlier been anticipated. Also, performance in the Soviet livestock sector is lagging and grain feed use is expected to be up only slightly from 1979/80.

Export Activity. After 3 days of Soviet grain sales this week, purchases during the fifth Agreement year total 1.2 million tons of corn and 550,000 tons of wheat.

Argentina to Supply Mexico with Grains, Oilseeds. Argentina announced that it has signed an agreement to supply Mexico with a minimum of 2 million tons of grains and oilseeds during 1981 and 1982, including 400,000 tons of corn, 300,000 tons of sorghum, and 300,000 tons of soybeans or sunflowerseeds.

Mr. Albright was the co-founder of the National Park Service which was established in 1916 and he was its second director. He is widely regarded as a distinguished conservationist for his foresight as director of the Service and for his activities on conservation issues since then. The government's basic policies governing the administration of the National Park System, which he first enunciated and which still remain in effect, are the result of Mr. Albright's vision for the preservation and protection of our Nation's wonderlands. Through the years, Mr. Albright's advice and wisdom have been available to me, my predecessors, and other government officials on vital conservation issues.

Mr. Albright is now 90 years old and he was recently widowed. Recognizing that this request is a very unusual one, especially in light of the fact that you have recently awarded the Medal of Freedom to a highly distinguished group of people, I, nevertheless, would like to request that the Medal of Freedom be awarded at this time to Mr. Albright.

The National Park Service was established on August 25, 1916. On August 25 of this year there will be a banquet here in the Washington area to commemorate the establishment of the Service. It is hoped that you would approve the granting of the Medal of Freedom to Mr. Albright so that an announcement could be made to Mr. Albright by a telephone hook-up to his home in California from the banquet.



VETO STATEMENT

I am returning without my signature H.R. 7102, the Veterans Administration Health Care Amendments of 1980, because this bill would provide \$80 million a year ^(Veteran Administration) to ^(VA) physicians in unwarranted salary bonuses rather than target that amount on veterans themselves.

As President, I have worked with the VA to ensure that the health care provided to our veterans is the finest in the world. Toward that goal, during the last three years, I have supported and signed legislation to expand and improve the treatment of all veterans ^{who} ~~in~~ need to receive care from the ^{Veteran Administration} VA. Clearly, much more remains to be done for our veterans, and it is essential that we direct additional funds ~~directed~~ to those most in need.

What is not essential, and what does not further our goal of directly helping sick and disabled veterans, is spending ~~\$80~~ ^{a large sum of money} million to give VA physicians currently earning an average of \$55,000 a year up to 38% bonuses, making them by far the highest paid medical personnel in the entire government. Indeed, so generous are the bonuses provided in this bill that mid-career VA physicians could earn ~~over \$76,000 a year~~ ^(\$76,200 vs \$58,700) 30% more ^{annual salary} than the maximum authorized ^{in pay} for Armed Forces physicians. The Defense Department has recommended a veto of this bill because this differential ^{in pay} may adversely affect its ability to solve the current physician recruitment and retention problems in the military.

I am concerned about attracting and retaining excellent VA physicians. But the current salary and benefits are more than sufficient to do that. At the same time, the current level of health care is not, in all areas, sufficient. Therefore, rather than spend \$80 million on ^{unnecessary} bonuses for ^{a relatively few} 10,000 physicians, I would prefer that the Congress target ^{funds more directly} ~~that amount~~ on improving ^{health} direct care benefits and treatment for veterans.

~~I recognize that, in this political season, a vetoed bill is likely to become the subject of an emotional debate. But I stand second to no one in working to help our nation's veterans live a better life. For that reason, I am willing to take the risk of political attacks over this veto because I feel deeply that we need to continue working to improve the health care treatment of veterans, rather ^{than} to veer off that course to provide unnecessary and excessive bonuses to veterans' physicians.~~

I therefore urge the Congress to pass a bill which meets that goal. To speed that progress, I have asked the VA Administrator to prepare, for prompt submission and consideration, a bill which will meet the VA's real needs for certain ²¹⁷ physician specialists, while providing -- from the money that would have been projected for bonuses -- for improved health care treatment of veterans.
