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

October 14, 1980

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Delaware. Biden is campaigning statewide for C/M.

New York. Shirley Chisholm endorsed C/M, admitting that she had negotiated with Reagan about an endorsement. Some Jewish leaders are asking Javits to withdraw to avoid a D'Amato victory.

Rhode Island. Ted Mondale's visit went very well.

Alabama. Birmingham News endorsed Reagan. Bill Simpson getting very good press in rural Alabama.

Florida. Jesse Jackson got good coverage.

Louisiana. Sen. Johnston, speaking to an audience of professionals, told them he would not ask them to vote for Carter. Coretta King received good coverage.

Tennessee. Poll: Carter 45, Reagan 38, Anderson 7.

West Virginia. Poll: Carter 40, Reagan 28, Anderson 5. Carter gained 3 points since mid-September, Reagan unchanged.

Indiana. Poll: Reagan 51, Carter 28. Bayh is trailing Quayle.

Minnesota. Poll: Carter 34, Reagan 30, Anderson 14.

Missouri. Post Dispatch endorsed Carter. President's visit, Bergland's visit, got good coverage.

Ohio. Watson and Metzenbaum doing radio feeds.

Wisconsin. Cong. Drinan, campaigning for C/M in Milwaukee, called on Anderson to quit the race. St. Rep. Lee, the leading Democratic Anderson supporter, switched to C/M.

California. Alice B. Toklas Club in San Francisco (gays) endorsed Carter.

Idaho. President of National Farmers Organization endorsed C/M. Church is leading Symms 45-40%.

Oregon. Oregon Journal endorsed Carter. First Lady's visit got good coverage.

South Dakota. Poll: Reagan 32, Carter 18, Anderson 8.

SUBJECT: New Jersey Drought Announcement

After your call to Stu last night, I checked with FEMA about what you can announce about the drought. FEMA is not anxious for you to make too strong an announcement because they are convinced that the expectation of a favorable emergency disaster declaration - which they believe is unwarranted - would then become too strong to resist. FEMA also fears a declaration would also encourage several other drought-affected states to seek declarations. (New Jersey has not yet filed a disaster declaration; Governor Byrne does not want to file if an unfavorable decision would be forthcoming. If he gets a favorable sign, he will file immediately).

FEMA's normal caution is obviously at play. Nonetheless, FEMA is now persuaded that an announcement along the following lines would be appropriate:

"I am very concerned about the water shortages the State is now suffering. Under Governor Byrne's leadership, the State has acted responsibly to deal with this serious problem. And the federal government has been working closely with State officials to assess what we might do to help as well. To make certain that I have the best and most up-to-date information about what the federal government can do, I am today directing a team of senior federal drought experts to come to New Jersey to inspect the water shortage problem. The team will be led by the Senior FEMA official (Bill Wilcox) in charge of drought and other disaster assessments. I have directed them to provide me with a report on their findings as soon as possible."

Stu recommends that you make this type of statement.

SUBJECT: Florida VA Cemetery -- Your Phone Call to
Senator Chiles

We have been working with Senator Chiles and the VA for several months on the issue of constructing a "national" VA cemetery for Florida, in the Withlacoochee Forest. While we have privately decided to approve it, no public announcement has yet been made. Senator Chiles knows of this decision, and is working with us to plan the most appropriate announcement. I understand your phone conversation with him tomorrow will be for him to discuss the issue with you in the presence of the veterans representatives.

BACKGROUND

Under the VA's regional cemetery policy "national" veterans cemeteries -- which are 100% federally funded -- are located in the ten Federal regions. A Southeast regional cemetery is to be constructed in Atlanta. However, many states have been pressing the VA for exemptions from the regional concept, in order to build new "national" cemeteries within their states. Florida, California and New York have made the strongest cases. To date, OMB and the VA have resisted these requests, and recommended instead the construction of "state" cemeteries -- those that are funded through a Federal/state match. We believe this approach to be more programmatically sound.

In Florida's case, however, two related factors make a strong case for approving an exemption from our policy:

- it has a high concentration of aging veterans; and
- construction on the regional cemetery in Atlanta has not yet begun, so that capacity in Florida's existing cemeteries will soon be strained.

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TALKING POINTS

After Senator Chiles has made the case to you for a "national" cemetery, you should express your interest in the issue, and say that you will look into it and let him know of your decision shortly.

You should thank him for his efforts, as well as Governor Graham's, on behalf of Florida's veterans, and assure him that you will take the veterans' views into account.

Subject: Industrial Production and Personal Income in
September

Industrial Production (to be released 9:30 a.m., Thursday, October 16)

Industrial production in September increased by 1.0 percent. This follows an increase of 0.6 percent in August which had reversed a string of six consecutive monthly declines.

Seasonally adjusted auto production rose a substantial 7.0 percent, bouncing back from a comparably-sized decline in August. (Seasonal adjustments in months surrounding model changeovers are tricky to estimate and this probably accounts for the erratic pattern). Other categories showing solid advances were appliances and home goods (1.1 percent), materials (1.2 percent), and construction supplies (2.0 percent).

Personal Income (to be released 11:00 a.m., Thursday, October 16)

Personal income in September rose 0.9 percent, bringing the increase since June to 3.3 percent. Among the major components, wages and salaries were up 0.8 percent and transfer payments rose 1.7 percent.

SUBJECT: National Corporation for Housing Partnerships

The National Corporation for Housing Partnerships was created by Congress within the 1968 Housing Act to encourage maximum participation by private investors in programs and projects to provide low and moderate income housing. The Corporation is funded by over 270 corporations and financial institutions.

The Board of Directors consists of 15 members. Twelve members are elected by the stockholders and three are appointed by you with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The following person's one-year term will expire at the end of this month. We recommend her reappointment to a three-year term.

Patricia K. Ritter (Connecticut): Co-founder and Director, Connecticut Housing Investment Fund; Chairperson, Mutual Real Estate Investment Trust. Both are programs to open housing for minorities and for the stabilization of neighborhoods; wife of attorney and former state legislator, George T. Ritter. Recommended for reappointment by Peter Kelly. Patti Knox concurs.

The National Council on Educational Research is the policy making body that works with the National Institute of Education. There are fifteen members of the Council appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. The terms of three members have expired. Each of these members served a special purpose on the Council and the Secretary of Education recommends that all three be reappointed. We concur with that recommendation.

Harold Howe, II (New York): Vice President for Education and Research at the Ford Foundation. Former U.S. Commissioner of Education. Currently serving as Chairman of the Council appointed by you last year.

Catharine C. Stimpson (Washington): Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of Whatcom Community College. She is active in civic affairs and has been very helpful to us in Washington. She is highly recommended by Senator Magnuson and Bob Thompson.

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

HAROLD HOWE II

Harold Howe II was named Vice President for Education and Research of the Ford Foundation in January, 1971. For two years starting in January, 1969, he served as advisor on education to the Foundation's office in India.

Mr. Howe was United States Commissioner of Education from 1965 through 1968, when he resigned to accept his appointment with the Foundation.

As Commissioner, he was responsible for planning and administering programs during the period of greatest growth of Federal aid toward education.

He has a long and varied background in education both as a teacher and administrator. From 1957 to 1960, he was principal of Newton High School in Newton, Massachusetts, where he helped to reinforce and enlarge the national reputation of the Newton schools for academic excellence and leadership in trying and adopting new approaches to teaching and school organization. He left Newton to become Superintendent of Schools in Scarsdale, New York, where he served until 1964, when he became the first Executive Director of the Learning Institute of North Carolina, a new experimental venture set up by Governor Terry Sanford to promote educational change in that state.

Mr. Howe began his education career as a teacher at Darrow School in New Lebanon, New York, and at Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts. He was a high school principal in Andover and Cincinnati, where he was also chairman of the Mayor's Committee on Juvenile Delinquency. In 1965, he was a co-author of the Report of the American Council of Learned Societies Commission on the Humanities. He is the author also of many articles concerning education.

If coal is the commodity involved, a train 119 miles long would be required to haul 1 million tons.

This calculation is derived in the following way:

- o The average coal-carrying car is 60 feet long.
- o Such a car can carry about 100 tons.
- o That would mean a trainload of coal cars carrying 100 tons would be 115 miles long.
- o However, an additional 400 engine cars would be needed to move such a train; that would add 4 miles to the train's length, for a total of 119 miles.

This fact can be stated in one of two ways:

- o A train 119 miles long would be needed to carry 1 million tons of coal or
- o 100 trains each with 100 cars would be needed to carry 1 million tons.

Last year, the United States produced 790 million tons of coal. If that were all placed in one train, its length would be over 80,000 miles, or three times around the equator.

It is 129 miles between Cleveland and Pittsburgh.

OCTOBER 15, 1980

1. The Navy should certify Quincy Shipyard for nuclear submarine overhauls. The Navy plans indicate approximately 150 sub overhauls through 1990. If General Dynamics were able to perform 2 overhauls each year, 1,200 jobs would be created annually. General Dynamics has indicated that it would make the \$20 million investment necessary for certification.
2. The Maritime Administration should expedite approval of construction differential subsidies and Title XI financing for 6 LNG tankers which General Dynamics recently contracted to build. This project would provide approximately 4,000 new jobs.
3. The Navy should make available for bid within the first naval district, substantial contracts for overhaul and repair of Navy ships. Such work enables the shipyard to maintain the stable employment force.
4. The CG-47 construction program should be split between a lead and a follow-on yard. This would assure competition in this highly costly vessel construction program. The Quincy Shipyard was the only other yard besides Litton deemed qualified by the Navy during the CG-47 award process two years ago. Each ship would support approximately 1,500 jobs annually over a 4-year period.

Nautilus Ceremony at Connecticut State House

1. GOVERNOR ELLA GRASSO, SENATOR ABE RIBICOFF, AND THE NEXT DEMOCRATIC SENATOR FROM CONNECTICUT, CHRIS DODD: I AM TAKING TIME OUT TODAY FOR A MATTER THAT IS DOUBLY SIGNIFICANT TO ME -- THE NAUTILUS MEMORIAL.

2. I RECENTLY SIGNED THE 1981 DEFENSE CONSTRUCTION AUTHORIZATION BILL, WHICH INCLUDED THE AUTHORITY TO ESTABLISH IN GROTON THE PERMANENT HOME OF THE U.S.S. NAUTILUS -- THE WORLD'S FIRST NUCLEAR-POWERED VESSEL, NOW RETIRED AFTER A DISTINGUISHED QUARTER-CENTURY OF ACTIVE SUBMARINE SERVICE.

3. I HAD THE HONOR OF SHARING IN THAT HISTORY. AS A YOUNG NAVAL OFFICER, I WAS IN THE NUCLEAR PROPULSION PROGRAM ESTABLISHED BY ADMIRAL HYMAN RICKOVER. I WAS STATIONED IN NEW LONDON AS PART OF THAT PROGRAM, AND MY THIRD SON, JEFF, WAS BORN THERE. ¶ YOU MAY HAVE NOTICED THAT I AND MY FAMILY STILL SPEAK WITH A CONNECTICUT ACCENT. ¶ I WATCHED THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE NAUTILUS AT NEARLY EVERY STEP, AND I REMEMBER VIVIDLY ITS KEEL-LAYING CEREMONY AT NEW LONDON. AFTER THE CEREMONY, ROSALYNN AND I KNEW THAT WE WERE WITNESSES TO A NEW CHAPTER OF HISTORY. ONE OF THE BIGGEST REGRETS IN MY LIFE WAS NOT BEING ABLE TO SERVE ABOARD THE ^{FIRST ATOMIC SUBMARINES} NAUTILUS -- THE DEATH OF MY FATHER CALLED ME HOME TO GEORGIA BEFORE THE NAUTILUS BEGAN ACTIVE SERVICE.

4. THIS YEAR, GOVERNOR GRASSO, SENATOR RIBICOFF, AND CONGRESSMAN DODD BROUGHT TO MY ATTENTION THE DECISION BY THE NAVY TO LOCATE THE NAUTILUS IN WASHINGTON, D.C., AS A NATIONAL HISTORIC SHIP. IT DIDN'T TAKE MUCH CONVINCING BY THEM THAT I SHOULD OVERRIDE THE NAVY'S DECISION. IT WAS ONLY A MATTER OF DAYS BEFORE I INFORMED GOVERNOR GRASSO THAT GROTON WOULD BE THE SITE OF THE NATIONAL MEMORIAL, IN KEEPING WITH THE NAVY TRADITION OF RETURNING SHIPS TO LOCATIONS WITH STRONG HISTORICAL TIES.

5. ELLA, I WANT TO PRESENT TO YOU AND TO THE CITIZENS OF CONNECTICUT THIS MODEL OF THE U.S.S. NAUTILUS. IT SHOULD HELP REMIND US ALL OF THE TECHNOLOGICAL ACHIEVEMENT REPRESENTED BY THE NAUTILUS. MORE IMPORTANT, IT WAS A HUMAN ACHIEVEMENT BY THE PEOPLE OF THIS COUNTRY AND THE PEOPLE OF SOUTHEAST CONNECTICUT. GROTON AND NEW LONDON ARE INDEED THE SUBMARINE CAPITAL OF THE WORLD. THE PEOPLE THERE HAVE DEVOTED THEIR LIVES TO KEEPING THE TECHNOLOGICAL EDGE THAT SUSTAINS THE GREATEST, MOST PRODUCTIVE ECONOMY IN THE WORLD AND A NATIONAL DEFENSE THAT TODAY IS STILL SECOND TO NONE. THIS ECONOMIC AND MILITARY CAPABILITY HAS GIVEN AMERICANS A QUALITY OF LIFE AND A STRIVING FOR JUSTICE THAT REMAINS TODAY THE ENVY OF THE WORLD. I WANT TO KEEP IT THAT WAY, AND I KNOW THAT I CAN COUNT ON YOUR HELP. THANK YOU.

I just want you to know that I wish you all the best in the coming season. I might add that while some critics might accuse me of "skating on thin ice" from time to time, I will definitely not be available for the Islanders this coming year. I intend to be busy elsewhere.

I know that your winning the Stanley Cup meant a great deal to the people of this area. It symbolized the stature Long Island has achieved in our country. I am talking not about your stature in terms of athletic prowess, but the stature of this whole community. Maybe it took your winning

the Stanley Cup to let people know just how far you have come.

The numbers speak for themselves. Long Island can no longer be dismissed as a "bedroom community." It is no longer just a suburb of New York City. The fact is, at least 75 percent of Long Islanders work right here on Long Island.

By a number of measures ~~automobile sales is one~~ Long Island now ranks among the 10 most important economic areas of the country. Pretend for a minute that Nassau and Suffolk counties were a separate state. In terms of your retail sales, you would rank ahead of half the other states. That gives you some idea of how far you have grown in three decades. It gives you some idea of your area's economic importance to our nation as a whole.

I have talked about Long Island as it is now. Let me say something about your future.

I believe that working together -- in a real partnership

of government, business, labor and the public -- we can make this country of ours energy secure and we can revitalize American industry.

I spoke earlier this week about an "economic renaissance." I believe we can achieve this kind of rebirth for our country. We can do it by developing new energy sources, by investing in our economic future, by creating incentives to investment, by building new plants and equipment, by modernizing our factories, by building whole new American industries.

I want your support on November 4 because I want to carry this program forward. I want to develop new energy supplies to fuel our cars, to develop new transportation systems. I want to revitalize the industrial northeast, to create new job opportunities here. Attacking the energy challenge, and increasing worker productivity will both play key roles in reducing inflation. They will get to the root causes of our inflation -- excessive dependence on foreign oil, and declining

productivity growth.

Our efforts will accomplish something else. They will create needed job opportunities, including high technology jobs, in places like Long Island. There is no reason why the young people who grow up in Long Island should have to go off and look for opportunities in other parts of the country. There is no reason that families should have to be separated for either economic or career reasons.

I know that you care about these issues. I know, for example, that this area has some of the highest energy bills and some of the highest property taxes in our country. I came here today to talk about this and other issues that may concern you. You can ask any question you want. That is what campaigns in our great country should be all about -- asking tough questions and getting good answers.
