MEMORANDUM FOR THE UNITED STATES TRADE REPRESENTATIVE

I have signed into law an Act "To approve and implement the protocol to the trade agreement relating to customs valuation, and for other purposes." That action enables you to exercise delegated authority to accept for the United States the Protocol to the Agreement on Implementation of Article VII of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade. Following such acceptance, that portion of the above mentioned Act implementing the Protocol may become effective when the European Economic Community also implements the Protocol. I hereby delegate to you the authority to make that determination as required by section 2 of the Act.

This document shall be published in the Federal Register.




Dear Hugh:


In the new classless order, perhaps, you will set the social and cultural standards by taking over Betty Beale's column.

SUBJECT: Board of Trustees of the Woodrow Wilson
International Center for Scholars

The Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars was established by Congress in 1968 as an institution for advanced study.

The Board of Trustees is composed of sixteen members, including the Secretaries of State, Health and Human Services and of the Smithsonian; as well as the Director of the International Communication Agency, the Chair of the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Librarian of Congress, the Archivist of the United States, and nine members appointed by you. One of these members is appointed from within the Government, to represent you. Currently, Stu Eizenstat occupies this position.

There is one vacancy for a Presidential appointment from civilian life for a six year term.

We propose that you appoint Stu Eizenstat to this vacancy, effective upon his retirement from Federal service. Stu has served well as your representative on the Board and would very much like to continue as a public member.

Subject: Unemployment and the PPI in November
(to be released at 9:00 a. m. Friday)

Unemployment

The unemployment rate fell fractionally to 7.5 percent in November from 7.6 percent in October.

Total employment rose by 220,000 persons (as measured in the household survey) while the labor force gained 140,000. Solid employment gains were recorded in durable goods manufacturing and services.

Aggregate hours worked advanced a healthy 0.6 percent with large gains in manufacturing (1.0 percent) and construction (1.6 percent).

Wage increases in November provided the one bit of disturbing news as wages rose a quite large 1.0 percent. Over the past three months wages have risen at a 10.3 percent annual rate.

Producer Prices

The PPI for finished goods rose 0.6 percent in November. Among the components, food increased by a modest amount (0.5 percent) but energy rose a more substantial 1.3 percent.

Overall the price news is not bad. But the underlying rate of inflation remains in the 9 percent range.

SUBJECT: State, Justice, Commerce and Judiciary
FY'81 Appropriations Bill

The House adopted the Conference Report on the State, Justice, Commerce and Judiciary FY '81 Appropriations on Friday morning. The Senate is expected to do the same before Thanksgiving.

We are unanimous in our opinion that you should veto the bill because of the antibusing rider, but we are concerned about the timing of the announcement of your decision. If a clear signal of your intention is given too early, the Congress will have the opportunity to add further restrictive language, such as the grain embargo, onto the Continuing Resolution.

Therefore we feel that it is important not to signal your intention to veto the bill until the Continuing Resolution is passed. Our estimated timetable is that the appropriations bill will not physically arrive at the White House until December 1 or 2. About the same time the House should report from Committee (approximately December 1) and pass (approximately December 2) the Continuing Resolution. The Senate should act shortly thereafter.

After we are sure of what kind of restrictions are incorporated into the Continuing Resolution, we will recommend a further course of action.

Inouye voted against IDA in the appropriations sub-committee; he evidently figured he didn't have the votes. It would be helpful if you could indicate your distress and your hope that something can be done to retrieve the situation on the floor. Inouye should understand the importance you have placed on IDA and the long-term effect of this decision on an institution which your Administration has supported strongly and helps the poorest countries.

If IDA funds are not restored, the funding would probably be delayed until FY 1982, thereby undermining the bridge loan agreement arranged with other donors when the U.S. was unable to participate as scheduled on October 1, 1980. This action could well result in a suspension of IDA lending which would be blamed on the U.S. and be an embarrassment to Clausen as he assumes the Presidency of the World Bank.

Our best chance to sustain any attempted override of your vetos is in the Senate. There, we start with a base of 43 Senators, all of whom voted against the Helms Amendment when offered to the State-Justice bill Wednesday. Helms lost the first vote 46-45, but won 46-43 on a second and conclusive vote.

they are now at work in the Senate. All voted with us on Wednesday. All should be asked to actively lobby in favor of your position.

TALKING POINTS

1. My decision to veto the State-Justice bill was a difficult one, since I have always been skeptical about busing as a remedy for school desegregation. Nevertheless, I cannot approve legislation that limits the ability of myself or my successors to pursue Constitutionally-mandated remedies for civil rights violations.
2. If there is an override vote in the Senate on the State-Justice bill, I would like you to take a leadership role in contacting other Senators to sustain the veto.
3. If I am forced to veto the Continuing Resolution for the same reason, and I hope I am not, I hope you will do likewise.
